Executive summary

Executive summary

Who we are

Assolombarda is the largest local entrepreneurial Association in Italy, representing approximately 6,800 companies located in the area of Milano, Lodi, Monza Brianza and Pavia, employing more than 412,000 workers locally and several hundred thousands in the whole country.

Italy

Thanks to a Made in Italy recognized and esteemed throughout the world, Italy is well positioned in international rankings: an example of this is the growth in exports, which exceeds 480 billion euro.

Lombardy and Milan

Lombardy is the first manufacturing region in Italy. While concentrating only 17% of the national population, it accounts for a fifth of Italian GDP and a fourth of exports. It produces a third of highly cited scientific articles and patents. Lombardy and Milan feature a solid and highly diversified economy (from industry to trade, to services, to finance). Lombardy stands out for its international stance, the region being home to 6,800 MNCs for a total workforce of 697,000 and a turnover of 312.5 billion euros. These multinational companies are well-integrated in a dynamic network connecting small, medium and large firms, among which 100 in Milan boasting a turnover of over 1 billion euros. Lombardy is also an attractive place for innovative startups: 3,500, a third of total innovative startups in Italy.

Based on the innovation ecosystem and qualified human capital hosted, Lombardy and Milan rightfully assume the role of knowledge hub. The territory is home to the main Italian research centers, 12 CNR (Italian National Research Council), 19 IRCCS (Institutes for Treatment and Research) and 13 universities attracting 290,000 students, of which almost 15,700 foreign.


Italy ranks #5 economy in the world for manufacturing trade surplus ...











% firms by size class – 2019 Lombardy












Exports: Lombardy vs other European economies










- as many as 8 long-standing and prestigious universities, closely connected to the entrepreneurial system;

Gross Domestic Product % - 2019


